If you are looking for a church to call home, why not consider making this one your own? If this is your first time worshiping at St. John, please fill out the visitor information card stapled to your bulletin.

Everything you need to follow worship can be found in this bulletin. As you are comfortable, please rise when there is an * and join in the congregational responses, noted in **bold**. All songs are marked with numbers. The red book in the pew has all the songs. Look for the large number in the upper corner of the page to find the correct song.

During the time of **Peace**, you are invited to turn to those around you and offer a word of peace. We suggest a handshake and saying, "Peace be with you." You are also welcomed to offer another gesture of peace (wave, fist-bump, smile, etc.). Hand sanitizer is available in each pew.

At the time of **Offering**, you are invited to share a gift. Envelopes are available in the pews if you prefer. Online gifts may be made using the QR code below:



You may also offer updates to our ongoing prayer list using the yellow cards in the pews and placing them in the offering plates. **Visitor information cards** and member attendance cards (attached to the front of the bulletin) may also be placed in the offering plates.

As Lutherans, we believe Christ is truly present in the elements of the Lord's Supper. At the time of **Holy Communion**, all baptized individuals are welcome to come forward via the center aisle, receive the elements, and return via the side aisles. We begin at the front of the right side, commune all on the right side, then we will invite the left side forward. When you come forward, you may receive the bread from the pastor (gluten free wafers are available), then prefilled cups with wine or grape juice from the assisting minister. You may consume the elements after receiving them then place the empty cup in the tray held by the acolyte. Those who do not receive Holy Communion are welcome to come forward for a blessing.

If you need a **restroom**, restrooms are located on the bottom floor at the far side of the building from the elevator. Restrooms may be accessed either via the stairs in the rear of the sanctuary, the stairs by the Greeting Area, or the elevator.

A playroom is available downstairs for children who need a break from the worship service. This room is by the elevator on the lower level. Children are also welcome to utilize the books and puzzles available in the Greeting Area on the top level by the elevator.

As you prepare for worship, you are invited to fill out the blue prayer request forms located in each pew. The cards will be collected during our hymn of the day, and prayers will be offered during the prayers of intercession.

PRELUDE and ANNOUNCEMENTS

GATHERING

The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with all of you. (2 Corinthians 13:13)

Today we celebrate reformation as we remember the work of Martin Luther in the church. One of the ways Luther wanted to see reform in the church was in the way in which worship happened. Luther wanted the people to understand the liturgy. He wanted them to be taught about the gospel through the worship service.

Worship is fundamental to our Christian identity. We are people gathered around Word and sacrament and sent to live out God's own mission in the world. In worship, we encounter God's mission to the world, centered in Jesus Christ. Jesus is the living and abiding word of God proclaimed in the scriptures. Jesus is the bread of life present and given in holy communion for the life of the world. So today we will be slowing down our worship liturgy, remembering the way God moves through scripture in our liturgy. Martin Luther's reformation happened over five hundred years ago. But we are still learning, still growing, and still reforming as church.

Let us now take a moment to quiet our hearts and minds for worship.

In the service of Holy Communion, the Holy Spirit gathers people around the means of grace—the Word of God and the sacraments. Gathering on Sunday, we remember first day of creation when God made darkness and light. Sunday is the day that the crucified and risen Christ appeared to the disciples and was made known to them in word and in the breaking of bread. The heart of worship is what God does and what God gives. In the presence of all of us together, in baptism, in the word sung and preached and prayed, in the gift of the body and blood of Christ in holy communion, we participate in God's mission to the world.

As we gather, music gives us a common identity. A gathering song welcomes us to the mercy of God and moves us from our individual experiences into the communal activity of worship. Jeus said, "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them." (*Matthew 18:20*)

Let us "sing to the Lord a new song, God's praise in the assembly of the faithful" (Psalm 149:1)

*GATHERING SONG By Grace We Have Been Saved (ACS 1006)



We confess our sin and receive God's word of forgiveness, giving thanks that, even when we are dead in our trespasses, God makes us alive together with Christ (*Ephesians 2:5*). Together we are brought into the presence of God with an honest recognition of the reality of human sin and brokenness and our own sin and brokenness. Together we hear God's promise and declaration of forgiveness.

*CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

Blessed be the holy Trinity, + one God, who forgives all our sin, whose mercy endures forever. **Amen.**

Let us pray: Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you and worthily magnify your holy name, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. But if we confess our sins, God who is faithful and just will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. (1 John 1:8-10)

Most merciful God,

we confess that we are captive to sin and cannot free ourselves. We have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. For the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ, have mercy on us. Forgive us, renew us, and lead us, so that we may delight in your will and walk in your ways, to the glory of your holy name. Amen.

God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved . . . I pray, that according to the riches of his glory, he may grant that you may be strengthened in your inner being with power through his Spirit, and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love. (*Ephesians 2:4-5; 3:16-17*)

Amen.

In response to God's promise of forgiveness, we sing a song of praise, giving thanks for God's glory revealed in Jesus Christ. After each verse, we return to the refrain, joining with the chorus of angels proclaiming, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom God favors" (Luke 2:14).

*PRAYER OF THE DAY

Let us pray. Almighty God, we thank you that your Holy Spirit renews the church in every age. Pour out your Holy Spirit on your faithful people. Keep them steadfast in your word, protect and comfort them in times of trial, defend them against all enemies of the gospel, and bestow on the church your saving peace, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

The Prayer of the Day gives thanks to God through Jesus Christ, prayed in the power of the Holy Spirit. It gathers our praise into one, highlighting themes from the scripture we are about to hear. In scripture reading, preaching, and song, the church hears the good news of God acting in this and every time and place. The first reading is followed by a psalm sung in response to the reading. After the second reading and before proclaiming the Gospel, we join in another sung response. This pattern of "read, sing, read, sing" is a practice Christians inherited from the ancient synagogue worship of the Jewish people. Before the Gospel is read, we stand and acclaim the living Word among us. The Gospel then leads directly to preaching. Luther considered preaching to be the first of two peaks in the worship service. Preaching participates in the creating and transforming word of God, proclaims Jesus Christ crucified and risen, and brings God's word of law and gospel into our time and place to awaken and nourish faith. The Holy Spirit works through preaching, forming and empowering us to carry out the mission of God in our daily lives.

"Hear the Word of the Lord." (Jeremiah 2:4)



SECOND READING: Romans 3:19-28

A reading from Romans.

¹⁹Now we know that whatever the law says, it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be silenced, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. ²⁰For "no human being will be justified in his sight" by deeds prescribed by the law, for through the law comes the knowledge of sin.


²¹But now, apart from law, the righteousness of God has been disclosed, and is attested by the law and the prophets, ²²the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction, ²³since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; ²⁴they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, ²⁵whom God put forward as a sacrifice of atonement by his blood, effective through faith. He did this to show his righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over the sins previously committed; ²⁶it was to prove at the present time that he himself is righteous and that he justifies the one who has faith in Jesus.

²⁷Then what becomes of boasting? It is excluded. By what law? By that of works? No, but by the law of faith. ²⁸For we hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law.


REFLECTION

God's word is proclaimed as we confess our faith. We confess the creed as a response to the word and proclamation of the word. A creed is a statement of the faith of the whole church. The Apostles' Creed is anchored in holy baptism. The Nicene Creed explores the wonder of the incarnation. Each creed links us to the saints, our ancestors in faith, and is a confession of faith that unites us with the church around the world and people of every nation (*Revelation 7:9*).

*APOSTLES' CREED

God's word read and preached, sung and acclaimed, leads the assembly to the Prayers of Intercession. In these prayers, we respond to St. Paul's invitation for supplications, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for everyone as we pray for the wideness of God's mercy to be known throughout the world, for the church, for the well-being of creation, for peace among nations, for the poor and all in need, for local needs and special concerns (*I Timothy 2:1*). Following the prayers of intercession, the assembly greet each other in the peace of the risen Christ. This greeting is more than a "good morning." This greeting is the very peace by which Jesus greets his disciples. The peace we share is a sign of God's mission of reconciliation among us and the reconciliation we have with one another in Christ Jesus (*Matthew 5:23-24*). The offering is not the payment of dues or fees, nor is it simply something to pay the bills of the church building. Our gifts of money symbolize, rightly understood, our giving of ourselves to Christ and the cause of the church. We offer ourselves in grateful response, and this giving includes our property and our praise.

We should give in joy and thankfulness for all God has done for us and continues to do. It is important to realize that giving money is only part of what offering should be. God has given much to us- our lives, our bodies, our talents and skills, our homes and families, everything. Therefore it is also important to offer God more than money. This means giving of our time and talents as well.

Trusting in God's abundant mercy, let us offer our prayers for a world in need. *A brief silence for reflection*

God our parent, you call us your children and have made us siblings through your son Jesus. Heal the church's many divisions, bring understanding and peace where there has been contention and strife, and unite us in one body through the love of Christ. God of grace, hear our prayer.

God our creator, your hands have made the heights of the mountains, the depths of the sea, and the life that animates all creation. Bring relief to areas harmed by wildfires, floods, storms, and human carelessness. Renew the face of the earth. God of grace,

hear our prayer.

God our ruler, the nations rage and the kingdoms shake, but your word stands fast forever. Let your justice and peace roll down like waters wherever there is strife, injustice, war, or religious conflict. God of grace,

hear our prayer.

God our champion, you are our refuge and strength, a very present help in times of trouble. Draw near to all who suffer especially Bob, Geneva, Cherry, Winnie, Henry, Harry, Ellen, Ruth, Sally, Katie, Debi, Anne, Karen, Nan, those on our prayer list, all whom we remember aloud or in our hearts and all who suffer in any way with the oil of healing and grant them renewal. Be their rest and comfort. God of grace,

hear our prayer.

God our reformer, you make all things new. Free us from complacency, open us to unexpected ways, and kindle zeal in us for the future. We pray for young people affirming their baptism. With them, stir in us a desire for your wisdom. God of grace,

hear our prayer.

God our savior, you made yourself known in the lives of all who have died in the hope of your grace. We give thanks for the witness of reformers like Martin Luther and for all whose example has brought us closer to you. God of grace,

hear our prayer.

Gracious God, we hear your desire to call upon you in every need. We lift now the prayers on the hearts of this congregation this day (*blue prayer cards are read*). Into your hands we commend all for whom we pray, trusting in your unending love and amazing grace; through Jesus Christ, our Savior.

In your grace, we offer ourselves to your service and dedicate our lives to the care and redemption of all that you have made, for the sake of him who gave himself for us, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

The proclamation of the Word of God and the celebration of the Lord's Supper are connected. Luther called these the two "high points" in the service of Holy Communion. In the Word read and proclaimed, God speaks to us. In the Lord's Supper – a "visible word" of which Luther speaks – God feeds us with the presence of Jesus Christ. Before the Lord's Supper is shared, we offer thanksgiving for the gifts of creation and redemption. We join our voices with all of creation and sing "Holy, Holy, Holy" (Isaiah 6.3). In the meal of Holy Communion, the grace of God's gift for us is always proclaimed in Jesus' own words of command and promise. The prayer of thanksgiving includes praise to God for creation, for God's faithfulness to the people of ancient Israel, for God's revelation in the saving work of Jesus Christ, remembering the crucified and risen Christ, and praying for the Holy Spirit in this meal. The Great Thanksgiving concludes with the Lord's Prayer.

*GREAT THANKSGIVING

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Let us lift up our hearts to God in heaven (Lamentations 3:41)

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

It is indeed right, our duty, and our joy, that we should at all times and in all places give thanks and praise to you, almighty and merciful God, through our Savior Jesus Christ; who on this day overcame death and the grave, and by his glorious resurrection opened to us the way of everlasting life. And so, with all the choirs of angels, the church on earth and the hosts of heaven, we praise your name and join their unending hymn:

Remembering, then, his death and resurrection, we lift this bread and cup before you, giving you thanks that you have made us worthy to stand before you and to serve you as your priestly people.

And we ask you:

Send your Spirit upon these gifts of your Church; gather into one all who share this bread and wine; fill us with your Holy Spirit to establish our faith in truth, that we may praise and glorify you through your Son Jesus Christ.

Through him all glory and honor are yours, Almighty Father, with the Holy Spirit, in your holy Church both now and forever. **Amen.**






DISTRIBUTION OF COMMUNION
